Episode 3: "The Old Testament"

QUESTIONS

- 01**  Has something in the Old Testament ever caused you to question or doubt the existence and/or nature of God? If so, explain.

- 02**  If you grew up learning stories from the Bible, did you ever encounter people who tried to "tidy up" parts of the Old Testament? How did they do so?

- 03**  Andy mentioned that the texts in the Old Testament tell the story of God's fulfilled contract with the people of Israel. In contrast, his new covenant, instituted by Jesus, involves not just one nation but all nations. Does this change, challenge, or reinforce your view of the Bible and/or God? Explain.

- 04**  How is reading the Old Testament as a historical record of the Hebrew people different than reading it as a spiritual guidebook?

- 02**  Andy mentioned we should read the Old Testament for inspiration and motivation, but not application. Do you agree? Why or why not?
- 03**  Based on Jesus' new covenant command, what should be the primary focus of Christians' lives?
- 04**  What makes the idea of "loving one another as Christ loved us" difficult to embrace? How do Christians fall short in this area?
- 05**  Jesus' early followers based their faith on his extraordinary resurrection. What would happen if you were to revisit or begin your faith there, too?
